	More and more local graduates are going under the knife
	for better job prospects.
	[1] Nose jobs, eye enlargements and other cosmetic surgeries are gaining
5	popularity with local young job seekers as they believe such treatments can offer
	them better job prospects.
	[2] Janice, a 22-year-old university graduate, told a reporter how she spent
	HK\$40,000 on surgery to enlarge her eyes before starting her employment
	search. That was not the first time she had gone under the knife. When she was
10	17, she had her nose reshaped by a cosmetic surgeon in Taiwan. Obviously,
	Janice sees such an enhancement as a way to boost her self-esteem.
	[3] "I didn't think I was pretty enough when I was small. In fact, I thought I was
	rather ugly," she said. "My classmates used to tease me about my appearance so I
	saved up my pocket money bit by bit and went to have my first plastic surgery
15	operation in Taiwan."
	[4] Doctor Daniel Lee, a plastic surgeon in Hong Kong, noted that the number
	of young clients has grown markedly in recent years, up by almost 20 per cent.
	One or two decades ago, most of his clients were middle-aged or older.
	According to him, young patients on his book now are primarily in their twenties
20	and thirties. Surprisingly, some parents have brought their children to his clinic
	for cosmetic treatments, he remarked.
	[5] Many of his young clients believe that going for surgical procedures to
	improve their looks is a worthwhile investment in their career. Most of them do it
	during their school holidays or just after graduation before attending job
25	interviews.
	[6] A highly competitive job market, along with a better economy and higher
	beauty standards, may explain why young people are eager to improve their
	looks through surgery. The support from the celebrities has made these
30	treatments even more acceptable.
50	[7] More and more people are now choosing treatments such as Botox and collagen stimulators to redefine their facial features. These treatments cause less
	discomfort and side effects. They can also be done in about an hour and cost less
	than traditional surgeries.
	[8] However, beyond appearance, cosmetic treatments do not always solve the
35	core of the problem. On the contrary, they may lead to many complications in the
55	core of the problem. On the contrary, they may lead to many complications in the

future. For example, there are stories in the news of how cosmetic surgeons have made mistakes, leaving their patients disfigured.

[9] We need to ask whether our society is so image-driven that we would rather have people at jobs with fewer work skills but with better looks. If this is the

40 mindset of the employers, then the push for unnaturally beautiful people to fill positions is going to hurt, rather than help the companies that employ them. Excessive emphasis on how people look is **at odds** with our city that thrives on professionalism.

	Many schools organize volunteer clubs to get students involved.

	school's volunteer club. I usually visit the elderly, help collect money on Flag
	Days, give performances and organize events, all for charity.
	[2] Honestly speaking, volunteering can be time-consuming. If you are a
	full-time student, the time you spend volunteering may result in the other areas
10	of your life being neglected, like losing chances for ball games, hanging out
	with friends, etc. Also, while volunteer or pro bono work can be rewarding, you
	are not receiving any monetary compensation for your time. What's worse,
	volunteering in certain settings could put a strain on your emotion. Last week, I
	was very frustrated when I taught a teenager with learning difficulties how to
