- [1] I rubbed my eyes, yawned and reached for my cup of coffee. Looking around my small and untidy office, my heart sank. It was going to be a long day. I had mountains of paperwork to do and that was not my idea of fun. Despite the effects of the coffee, I felt tired.
- [2] 'Detective Digby,' shouted my boss from across the corridor. Of all the people in our office, he spoke the most loudly. 'A burglary has been reported. A woman has had some valuable items stolen. Get there as soon as you can.' I would rather be out solving crimes than staying in, so I did not argue. I drove to the crime scene, a grand house in the best part of the town.
- [3] When Celia Wood came to the door, I could see that she was a very glamorous woman.

  Her clothes were simple but expensive. She was carrying a tiny dog under her arm. In spite of its size, the dog seemed fierce. It growled and went to snap at my fingers as I reached out to shake its owner's hand. 'Calm down, little dog,' I said gently. It growled louder. I thought to myself I preferred cats to dogs.
  - [4] 'It's an absolute disaster!' cried Celia Wood. 'My diamond necklace and earrings have been stolen!' I started to write down the details of the crime in my notebook. #### Passage B (24 marks)

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## GMOs: What you need to know

[1] In the debate over GMOs - genetically modified organisms - it can be difficult to separate facts from misinformation. Are these crops unsafe? Or should we put our fears to rest and head for a GMO buffet?



[2] GMOs are plants and animals that scientists alter in a laboratory by inserting genes from

other organisms in order to make crops and livestock larger, stay fresh longer or more nutritious.

- [3] GMOs first appeared in our food nearly two decades ago, yet the debate on their safety continues. How many times do we have to debate this? The vast majority of scientists now believe that GM foods are safe. In 2016, the National Academics of Science, Engineering and Medicine published a report claiming that **it** found no solid evidence that foods from GMOs were less safe than foods from non-GMOs.
- [4] Some GM crops, such as golden rice, could solve health problems. Last year, nearly 700,000 young children in developing countries died from a lack of vitamin A. Was this preventable? Normal rice has no Vitamin A, but steamed golden rice contains enough to solve this problem.
  - [5] However, GMOs are restricted or banned in 38 countries worldwide, and a growing number of people are choosing to only eat organic produce, which is all-natural. Where does this fear come from? One issue is that GMOs have not been around for very long, so we cannot find any studies on the health effects over a full lifetime. There are also some concerns that there may be unexpected results of playing with nature.
  - [6] However, GMOs may become necessary in the future. As the world population increases, growing GM crops may be the only way to produce enough food for everyone.
- [7] Two decades ago, the Hong Kong government decided to make labelling products with GMO ingredients optional. Labels allow people to have the choice of whether or not to eat these ingredients. Opponents argue this creates unnecessary fear, and could raise the cost of food if companies feel they have to use all organic ingredients.

Though the debate rages on, it is clear that rigorously testing GMOs should continue. Also, as the saying goes, 'you are what you eat'. It is our responsibility to educate ourselves about our food.
